




**“refugees are in a way thrown outside the realm of “humanity,” as far as it is meant to confer the rights they aren’t afforded,”**

and not others.**




**The *homo sacer*;


**Fusion of horizons through dialogue**

**Voice:** the capacity to freely develop and express one's interest in the public sphere





Freedom, political action in public domain


**Monumental: "freedom as the criterion of a moral action" or as a right**



**Practical/critical: "freedom as a play-space", *Spielraum*,**




**Domination:** Closed, immobile and fixed power relations – social mobility is impossible




**Dialogic power relations:** mobile, changeable and fluid – social mobility is possible

 Refugee Crisis - Eastern and Central Mediterranean Routes



More than four in five (83 %) of the first time asylum seekers in the EU-28 in 2015 were less than 35 years old; those in the age range 18–34 years accounted for slightly more than half (53 %) of the total number of first time applicants, while nearly 3 in 10 (29 %) applicants were minors aged less than 18 years old.







## Multiculturalism:

- Cultural relativism
- Lack of engagement with the other
- Ethnic enclaves
- Focused on cultural differences as a problem
- Reproduces old values and norms



## Integration

- Homogenizing, top-down (monological dicta of the powerfull)
- Domination; majority culture as norm
- Power over minorities; marginalising



## Intercultural dialogues:

- Co-orientation is possible
- Engagement with each other
- Living a good life together
- Focused on erasing old colonial differences
- Produce new common values


