



WHAT ARE THE ARCHETYPES?

The word comes from the latinisation of the Greek noun ἀρχέτυπον (archétypon), whose adjective form is ἀρχέτυπος (archétypos), compound of ἀρχή arché, "beginning, origin",and τύπος týpos, , "pattern", "model", or "type".

Therefore, it means a pattern of thought, a constantlyrecurring symbol universally present in literature, painting, or mythology.




CARL GUSTAV JUNG

The common usage of the concept comes from the definition advanced by theSwiss psychiatrist Carl Jung: "the formulated meaning of a primordial image by which it was represented symbolically."

Jung explains:


"An archetype is like an old watercourse along which the water of life has flowed for centuries, digging a deep channel for itself.

The longer it has flowed in this channel the more likely it is that sooner or later the water will return to its old bed."

pushing down barriers, breaking down the limits, overcoming adversities.


THE VISIONARY

THE ORGANIZER








Jordan says:

THE VISIONARY



Don Draper is a fictional character and the protagonist of the AMC television series Mad Men (2007-2015), portrayed by Jon Hamm. Draper was creative director of fictional Manhattan advertising firm Sterling Cooper. He is charismatic, fascinanting, imperscrutable, confident and full of contradictions. He is considered a genius by colleagues and rivals.



Draper says:

"You're born alone and you die alone and this world just drops a bunch of rules on top of you to make you forget those facts. But I never forget. I'm living like there's no tomorrow, because there isn't one."





John Keating is a fictional character from the movie "Deads Poets Society" (1989) by Peter Weir. English teacher at Welton Academy, John Keating know for his unhortodox methods. He encourages his students to "make your lives extraordinary", a sentiment he summarizes with the Latin expression carpe diem, meaning "seize the day". He invites them to take turns standing on his desk to demonstrate ways to look at life in a different way, he invites them to rip out the introduction of their poetry books which explains a mathematical formula used for rating poetry.
