PROS:

Building international profile (students & teachers)

Globalization: demands, responsibilities and global competition

Emigration problems: brain drain

Rima Rimsaite 2: Solutions to challenges: accentuating the pros

Internationalization as a tool for development of education

Policy: institution's international profile & mobility strategy structured, strategic approach to partnerships coherent, cross-institutional approach to internationalization

Actions: internationalization of curriculum / integrated mobility quality improvement of mobility (tools) widened access to mobility (more diverse opportunities) measures for reciprocal exchange improved mobility data collection

Values: benefits from mobility / articulation of results sharing best practices increasing social and global responsibility

Changing/increasing role of IRC





Togetherness

articulated needs + provided support + reflected/shared best practices = growing and improving together

Being proactive / thinking ahead

WG (developing the role of IRCs): planning continuing education courses for IRCs sharing knowledge

AEC (coordinative role):

extended cooperation with other associations (global); building various IT platforms (i.e. Erasmus alumni, teachers, artistic research; on-line mobility tools (application, 'touch exchange')); offering forums (i.e. continuing education courses for IRCs)

Kaarlo Hilden 1: Lessons learned: pros and cons of mobility



- + Increased awareness of global trends & good practices
- + Reflection -- professional growth
- + Important support for institutional change processes
- + Possibility of contributing to systemic change
- Resource consuming
- Development through trial and error: sometimes low investment/return -ratio
- Adds to the complexity of planning and leading





- Define internationalization and why you are doing what you are doing
- Define what you have to offer and what you expect in return (matching expectations)
- Do not underestimate the "not invented here" syndrome
- Invest time in getting to know the context of your partners

Kaarlo Hilden 3: How can the AEC support its members?



- Semi-structured networks of critical friends developing communities of practice
- Shared challenges shared groundwork and policy development
- International innovation funnel
- Trend scouting & early warning system

Jacques Moreau 1: Lessons learned: pros and cons of mobility



CONS:

Difficult mobility for students
The native language to be spoken

Mobility for trainers

The so different contexts, systems and concepts for training teachers, from a country to another one

"Technology transfer"

Wide opened eyes on the evolving musical world and the generalized observation of the changing roles of musicians

Jacques Moreau 2: Solutions to challenges: accentuating the pros



Developing exchange of information, comparing solutions for similar problems solved

Pointing out similarities between institutions

But valuing the differences between institutions

Developing what it really means to build a generalized student centered curriculum (procedures, assessment,...)

For us, actually going further in our technology transfer process

Paolo Gasparin 1: Lessons learned: pros and cons of mobility



pros

- mobilty increases linguistic skills of the students;
- mobility gives a wider range of possibilities in choosing best teachers and institutions for one's own discipline;
- mobility lets the students compare different educational models, taking the best from anyone, and broaden the perspective;
- mobility increases student's network of relations.

cons

- credit transfer is not always working as it should: so credits got by students in a foreign conservatoire are not entirely recognized when they come back;
- scholarships and financial aid in mobility programmes often are not sufficient to cover student's needs. So families must provide instead.
- moving from an educational paradigm to another could result in slowing down the learning process, considering the time needed to familiarize with new standards.

Paolo Gasparin 2: Solutions to challenges: accentuating the pros



Student's perspective should become structural not only in planning mobility strategies but also in any decision making place.

- mobility programmes should take into account that musicians used to move from one institution - and country - to another long before Erasmus or Leonardo were made, as they pursue their personal growth.
- "thinking international" should not be set in opposition to "thinking locally": the international dimension should not erase but integrate the local dimension.
- enhancing financial aid also would generally accentuate the pros.

Paolo Gasparin 3: How can the AEC support its members?



Creating a student organism internal to AEC, where students coming from the member institutions can share experience, give their feedback and contribute to decision making, would meet this need. The creation of a european network of national student associations leaded by AEC should be alternatively taken into account.
