

# MUSICWEB NEWSLETTER I, AUTUMN 2003

#### WHAT IS MUSICWEB?


MusicWeb, which started in 1995, is a collaborative European project which aims to develop resources, technical infrastructure and demonstration applications to support a well-structured learning environment for a diverse body of students in the field of Music. The MusicWeb project is making a significant contribution to the variety and quality of music education by exploiting multimedia and distributed network technology and developing an interactive environment, an international approach and innovative methods for the integration of sound, text and graphics. This integration enables the efficient display and manipulation of music notation within the web based environment, which is a critical area of music-technology research today.

# THE MUSICWEB eLEARNING PROJECT

The basic technological framework of *MusicWeb* was originally developed with the support of the CONNECT Initiative of the European Commission. During the CONNECT phase, a basic resource collection was also created, comprising several hundred

notated and performed examples of classical and contemporary music embedded in a series of demonstration packages that concentrate on core musical skills, such as aural training, musical analysis and score reading, and on electro-acoustic computer music.

The current phase of the project is supported by the European Commission's eLearning Programme and runs from November 2002 to June 2004. The main objectives of this phase are to improve the functionality of the technological infrastructure, to create additional music educational modules and to present the *MusicWeb* concept to a wider user group. This dissemination will take place by means of a series of seven seminars held in institutions for professional music training in various European countries. The aim of the seminars is to give as many participants as possible the opportunity to learn how to access *MusicWeb* and to develop customised music educational



materials of their own within their own *MusicWeb* framework. Seminar participants should then be able to deploy the *MusicWeb* concept in the institutions and develop new education materials which can be added to the *MusicWeb* collection.

The dissemination seminars, which will be organised with the assistance of the Association Européenne des Conservatoires, Académies de Musique et Musikhochschulen (AEC), will take place during the spring of 2004 in AEC member institutions for professional music training in Oslo, Groningen, London, Helsinki, Paris, Malmö and Hannover. The seminars will be prepared and presented by two experts from the *MusicWeb* Steering Group, in close collaboration with the host institutions. The dissemination materials and evaluation results will be among the planned publications.

With the establishment and adoption of the *MusicWeb* framework by a wider user community, the project should become self-sustaining through the continuing expansion of the range of contributed educational materials.


